China's activities in Africa have expanded dramatically in recent years. Diplomatic engagement, foreign aid, trade, investment and lending have all grown substantially. Beijing hosted a major summit meeting of African leaders last year, and President Hu Jintao recently completed a tour through the African continent. China has become a major donor and trading partner to African countries, overtaking such traditional powers as the UK.

China's new engagement suggests a major transition in the strategic landscape of Africa. What are the trends in China's African relations, and the possible implications? While some observers see new opportunities for African economic development and strategic balancing, others see maneuvers for energy and commodities, along with possible liabilities for governance and security.

This conference will examine the scope of China's expanding involvement in Africa, the application of alternative models of aid and development, effects on governance and security in the region, and policy options in a changing strategic landscape.
