- ³⁄₄ of local governments are below national HDI of .453 '06
- 76% of people surveyed perceive themselves as "poor"
- Infant mortality, a "health proxy" : 120/1,000 vs Nigeria at 100/1,000
- 40% of children malnourished
- HIV rates: 5.8% all; 8.9% 20-24 age group; both higher than Nigeria overall
- High unemployment: 40% in 15-24 age group



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



MAP OF THE NIGER DELTA






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Environment of Dependency

Federal Government Central Resource Flows






NDDC'S N3.8B ROAD CONSTRUCTION STALLED BY CRISIS





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
Revised Community Approach: Global Memorandum of Understanding (GMOU)

- Risk of elite capture: "like political parties"
- Low participation of women and youth







- Expanded training in science and technology to speed local recruitment
- Credit facilities for qualified local contractors
- Selling shares to communities: Eleme Petrochemical Company (Indorama)
- Granting oil blocks to incorporated community youth

ND Minister Meets the Oil Industry January 31, 2009

- "Since inaccessibility to the oil bearing communities of the Niger Delta appears as a recurring decimal, we wish to advise that you consider the construction of roads to link up the oil communities
- "...if oil firms employ people from their host communities to do most of the jobs, which are sometimes given out to non-indigenes, the level of restiveness in those areas would be drastically reduced.

The Oil Industry Responds

- A question received huge applause from every one present -
 - "If, like the honorable Minister said, it's now the responsibility of the oil companies to build roads, to build bridges, to build hospitals, I now ask a question: What is the responsibility of the Federal Government, the State governments, and the Local governments?"
